costs through Medicaid/ private insurance, and an improvement in availability of medical staff due to a reduction in unnecessary visits.

The United Way of Ellis County awarded a \$6,000 grant to DREAM, Inc. This grant will fund, in part, a partnership between DREAM and Fort Hays State University to offer the specific and specialized training required by addication counselors. This program will address the need for additional counselors with a higher level of professional competency as well as provide the best oo services for the addict in Ellis oo County.

In 2003, legislation went into effect that requires the courts to require mandatory treatment for drug offenders rather than incarceration. The law also requires programs to offer one on or more treatment options in needed to reach recovery. This current treatment programs \$13 billion annually. available in Ellis County.
